I am looking forward to meeting members and to add to my exonomia collection.

A.C.E. members can also attend the 106th Anniversary Convention of the ANA which will be held in New York City from July 30-August 3. There are always great exhibits, exceptional educational sessions and plenty of coin and exonomia for sale. If you can make it to the ANA convention go for it, it is well worth your time.

In this issue there is a continuation of the Chevy pieces and the article from TAMS by Michael L. Kolman. Also, the usual club auction, classified, maverick identification and member profile which features Bryan Ryker, the expert on the Fankhauser encased. Also, Jim Lawniczak has some comments that merit consideration and perhaps can lead to a new section in The Casement dealing with what members collect.

On the cover is a picture of the Lewis & Clark bell encased. According to Terry Trantow who has been a collector of L&C Expo tokens/medals for over 30 years feels the bell is the hardest to acquire even though the wooden encasement from this exposition carries a higher price tag. He feels the Lewis & Clark Chamberpot is the next toughest. Terry believes a fair market price for an Uncirculated piece is in the \$80 to \$100 range. He, however, was willing to pay \$150 for one because it is the only piece that he is missing

The auction in Issue 8 had 148 lots offered via five consignors. Twenty-one A.C.E. members participated and a total of \$462.93 was realized for the lots offered. There were 258 bids entered which places the bidder success rate at 57%. Eleven lots did not receive a bid. Six lots were reduced according to auction rules and there was one tie bid. Lot 123 received 12 bids and lot 100 10 bids. There is another auction in this issue and again there is no buyer fee or any cost to a consignor. Material must be received by the 15th of the month preceding the issue date. The prices realized for mail bid issue 8 is published further in this issue.

There is a membership flyer in this issue that can be reproduced and placed at you local, regional and state exonomia/coin shows. Even though our membership is around 116 members there is still room for more.

On your mailing label following your name is your membership number which is followed by another number which represents when your dues must be paid. This number corresponds with the issue number. Anyone who has a 9 after their ACE number owes \$7.00 which then will renew their membership for one year and assure that Issues 10,11,12 and 13 will be sent.

### New Maverick Listing

Members are encouraged to send encased mavericks to the editor but not more than 50 at a time. Please do not send encased that have a slim chance of being attributed. General business chains, banks, with generic headings, etc. However, business chains can be sent where there is a chance of a home office, in a case like this the State and city of the home office could be considered the place for attribution.

When sending your list of mavericks send a description and include all information on both sides, as well as the composition of the encased, size, shape, coin denomination and date of coin. If you don't care to send the list you may send the encasements. Package securely and include a check or stamps to cover return postage and insurance indicating the value you desire.

Keep in mind that members may want to contact the owner of a particular piece. So if you want your name and address to appear or to be shared if any inquiry should occur indicate that as well. Several members have inquired about wanting to buy, sometimes owner is unknown or I didn't keep a record of ownership or the piece is not for sale so a no reply indicates one of the above.

Mavericks are numbered and grouped with the first two letters of the surname or major topic. Each letter group will have its own set of numbers and each piece will also be numbered according to the order received. Also, the issue number has been added for easier future reference.

A maverick has no indication of town and/or state on the encasement and in some cases even lacks the name of the issuing business or subject.

## Potpourri/Information

### Palumbo's Restaurant and his encased cents....

For 110 years, Palumbo's was the place to go in South Philly. And when it burned down, it took the neighborhood with it. The block long restaurant, home to famous entertainers, thousands of brides and bridegrooms and generations of politicians - caught fire at 11:15 p.m. on June 20, 1994.

Arson caused the fire that destroyed Palumbo's. Someone entered the linen storage room on the first floor of the restaurant and banquet hall's Nostalgia Dining room and set fire to about 80 pounds of soiled table linens.

The location of the room - away from the street - allowed the fire to gain significant headway before being noticed. Then on Thurs., Aug. 25, 1994 the banquet hall that was all that remained went up in flames. This fire too, was of suspicious origin.

Two reminders that Palumbo's existed are the encased coins that bare his name. One reads, Frank Palumbo's/ 624 Catherine St./ Phila.//Ciros/ Walnut St. at 15th/Phila. (pictured are two crowns on each side) and the second type is the same except in place of Ciros it reads Click and pictured are glasses rather than crowns. Both types feature a 1946 Lincoln cent, the encasement is aluminum and the shape is round.



**Should encased be cleaned and if so how?**

I have a quick question for you or other members. Do encased collectors refrain from cleaning either the holder or the coin as coin collectors do? Is there an acceptable cleaning method? Two Questions!

**Rarity and why? Kolman Coincidence**

I do have a question I wish you would pose to the membership and see if anyone has an answer. Before 1952, The Philadelphia cents were predominately used in encasements. However, Philadelphia cents are very rare for years 1952-1957. Why?

An amazing coincidence occurred. The day after I got The Casement, I was in the downtown Cleveland coin shop -- Federal Coin Exchange. I mentioned to one of the owners that there were several Federal Coin Exchange encased, from the 1950s when the shop was out on the near West side on Pearl Road. He then told me their story of the founding of Federal Coin Exchange, when two brothers split up their coin business in the 50s -- the owner of Federal Coin Exchange was Mike Kolman, Michael's father.

**From an exonomia collector from Hawaii ...**

Hawaiian encased are tough, of the 50 or so different types, only 5 or so can be called common, and, while most book for \$25-\$35, they are not available to be bought...when they do become available, even lower grade examples will bring over book price (\$40-\$55), while higher grade examples will bring double the book prices. A lot of times these encased get sold privately between local collectors. At present, I think I have 7 of the 50, and I have only had the opportunity to purchase 3 or 4 others since 1993. I know of no one who has one of each, yet I do know someone who, I believe, has 48 different (although most are well-handed examples.

What do you Collect and Ernest Pierczyzinski former encased producer  
by Jim Lawniczak

First:

I haven't heard much in the Casement about collections of encased cents. What different types of collections are our members working on and who has a complete collection of what? I'd sure like to know. For example, I do not believe that anyone in the world has a complete collection of all 16 varieties (not even including any of the subvarieties) of Pan American Exposition encased. Is this correct or does anyone claim to have a complete collection? Is anyone else besides me working on a complete collection (I assume so, as I always seem to be the underbidder on the rarer pieces in auctions) and how close are they to completion?

I know that others are working on a collection of all fifty states and even believe that some have succeeded. Other possible collections include the 1904 St. Louis World's Fair encased as listed in Bob Hendershott's book; an Exposition and World's Fair collection, one from each exposition or World's Fair; a date collection 1900-1997 (I don't know of anyone who has this -- the eighties and nineties can be some of the toughest dates); the entire Fankhauser collection (maybe Bryan Ryker has this); the 1940s Chevrolet collection; an encased 20th century coin type collection (is the Barber dime, quarter and half, the Standing Liberty quarter and the Walking Liberty half even possible?). I would suggest that everyone write in and tell us what collections they have and what collections they are working on.

I'll start. I'm working on the date collection (I have 14 to go, including 1903, 1912, 1915, 1918, 1979, 4 in the 80s and 5 in the 90s including 1997), the state collection (7 to go, AL, DE, GA, HA, MS, UT, WY), the Pan American Exposition collection (I have 11 of the 16); and the Fankhauser encased (I'm about halfway there). Although I have been buying encased for about six years, I do not yet have a complete collection of anything.

Second:

I recently received a note from Norm Peters, noted token and encased dealer from New York, who gave me some interesting information about Ernest Pierczyzinski, who made and sold encased cents in Erie PA from the 40s through the 60s. Norm says that Ernest had a minimum order of 150, charged \$27.50 for the die and then charged 2 1/2 cents for round, 3 cents for horseshoe and 3 1/2 cents for bell encased (1 cent off if you supplied the cents).

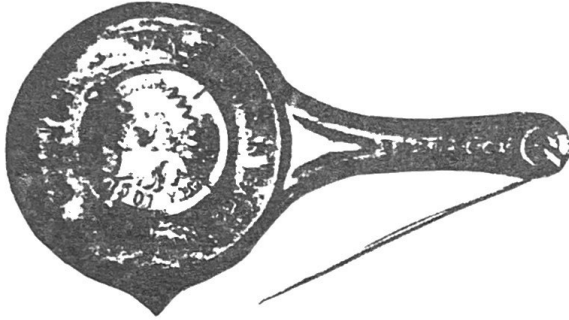

When the Pan-American Exposition was held at Buffalo, New York in 1901, the name "Pan-Am" naturally suggested frying pans.



The word "Souvenir" is on the handle of this brass frying pan. There is a stick pin at the end of the handle, so it could be worn.



On this piece the handle has been broken off; it should be about three times as long, with the wording "Buffalo, N.Y." on it. Most examples found have broken handles. With a complete handle, it is worth at least twice as much.



These rare vulcanite "poker chip" types have the encased cent on the

obverse. The reverse has a paper inset illustrating the Temple of Music.

Let's now move on to Lincoln cents. First we will see some of the mirror backs with the new Lincoln cent. The new design definitely renewed an interest in encasing coins, as can be seen by the many more advertisers using 1909 Lincoln cents than 1909 indians.

There is no way to finish the Lincoln cent section without the mention of a man named Eari Fankhauser from Fort Wayne, Indiana who called himself "The Penny Man." He had the dies and machinery to produce encased coins, and boy did he! For a period of years he went to coin shows and talked coin dealers into issuing encased cents. He probably went to every merchant in Fort Wayne to sell them on the idea, and he would talk to anyone about making an encased coin who would stop to listen.

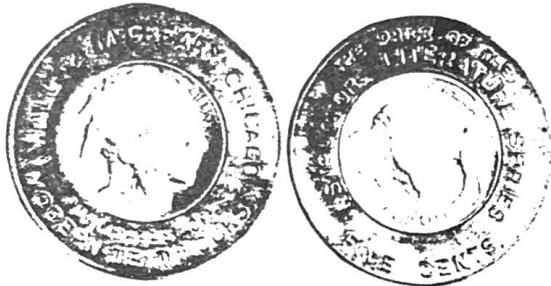
Fankhauser would charge, say, a price of \$75.00 to make a die, and then charge perhaps \$55.00 per hundred to make the coins. I have no idea how many different pieces he produced, but it has to be in the hundreds and five hundred plus would not surprise me. Illustrated are a few examples of his work. My



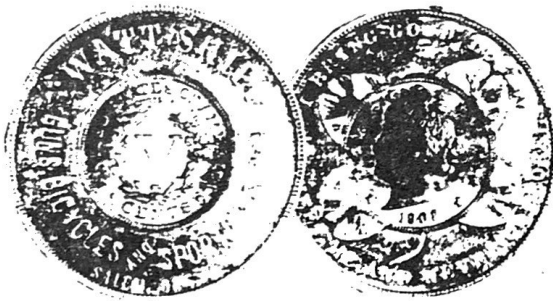


opinion is that these should not be valued too high at the present time: probably \$1.00 each would be plenty. However, many of them have been destroyed and just pitched out, so no matter what encased coins you have, please treat them with respect. As I said earlier, this is still a "virgin field" and someday there may be a research catalog issued. Then what looks like a rather common piece may turn out to be a rarity.

## Member Profile - Bryan G. Ryker

I have had the good fortune to talk via the phone with Bryan G. Ryker (ACE #82) and thought it would be nice to do a member profile on him for The Casement. He agreed and thus the article. We talked for 40 minutes and here are some of our interactions.

First, about his book on Frederick Earl Fankhauser, "The Penny Man" His Life and Work with Encased Coins, which was a major contribution to the encased hobby and an enormous undertaking by Bryan. He stated that the endeavor took about six years to complete and that in the process he put in many hours too numerous to even guess how many. One thing is for sure Brian's wife gave her support and patience or the project would have never materialized. Bryan felt it was all worthwhile for he made new friends and he experienced the thrill of the hunt and the excitement of new finds as well as getting to know his wife's extended family (for Earl was his wife's grandfather). Sadly, Bryan never got a chance to meet him. Earl passed away before Bryan married his granddaughter.

Bryan, his wife and three children live in Fort Wayne, Indiana but when he started the task of gathering the data for the book they resided in Connecticut. So there were additional obstacles and expenses communicating with people in Fort Wayne. Bryan is quick to give credit to many fellow hobby members and friends and relatives of Earl who helped make his work possible by giving of their time and sharing their memories. George Courtesis who helped with the background stories and attributing mavericks is one of the important players. Bryan stated that George's enthusiasm, feedback and friendly prodding were instrumental in providing motivation and encouragement.

Bryan also recognized Bruce Smith who began researching Earl in 1985 and submitted an article to TAMS which appeared in the Oct., 1993 issue. There were probably another 30 or so people who contributed in various ways. Many are fellow ACE members some of which are Jim Hemphill, Herman Aqua, Paul Cunningham, Richard Gaetano, Ken Hallenbeck, Jim Hartman, Myron Huffman, Cliff Mishler and Joel Reznick.

According to Bryan, Earl never kept any records, he did however have some overruns and some examples of what he had produced and this served as a nucleus for the listing of the pieces. There were some other encased that Earl had, one from the Stork Club, NY, which gave Bryan the clue he needed to determine where Earl had the encased produced. It was the Osborne Coinage Company from Ohio. Many collectors thought Earl was a diesinker who made all his own encased a fact that was inaccurate and one that Bryan dispelled.

Bryan stated that he has 95% of all the Fankhauser encased listed in his book and that he pretty much concentrates his collecting interest to this area. He feels as though there are some undiscovered pieces out there that are yet to be listed. However, since the completion of the book he has not found any but the search continues.

When asked about rarity Bryan stated he wasn't sure. Early dates, 1948 and 1950 of which 14 different types make up these dates maybe are tougher but he has no stats to back this up. Subject area, such as automotive, location, Hawaii for one and higher denomination seem to be favorites to collectors but rarity is unclear and difficult to determine. He said, "Once a collector has a piece they no longer want another so demand does not necessary coincide with rarity." He knows of five or six collectors who are after a complete collection. Yes, his book has made the Fankhauser encased more popular and prices are going up, many are still available at the \$2.00 range but just as many are selling for \$4.00 or \$5.00.

ACE collectors wishing to purchase the Fankhauser book can send \$7.50 to Bryan at 1808 Grey Birch Road, Fort Wayne, IN 46804. Bryan appreciates ACE and hopes that more members will share their E-mail address and that The Casement will eventually be a monthly publication. He enjoys the hobby and stated many fine people make up the collecting fraternity.

He says its encouraging to see issues that he struggled with when writing his book being discussed and debated, such as rarity, value and condition. He would enjoy hearing from others about his book, new background stories, questions, finds and want lists.

Brian belongs to the Old Fort Coin Club of Fort Wayne, Central States, TAMS and the ANA. The 1957 original Old Fort Coin Club encased is still available for \$3.00 plus a S.A.S.E. Also, there are some new

encased being produced which are being limited in numbers and made for the collector. There are two types, both read Old Fort Coin Club/Fort Wayne, Indiana//40th Anniversary/1956-1996\\KMAHGL, HS,AL. This one has Bryan's name in very small letters which is keeping with Earl's tradition and is referred to as Die II. Die II is being made into a set of five consisting of a 1956 P and D, a 1996 P and D and a 1996 Canadian Cent. Cost is \$12.50 plus 78c postage. Mintage: 50 sets Type I is almost the same except it is green aluminum, Bryan's name is incomplete on the bottom and the generic side reads KMANGB. Type I sells for \$2.00 plus a 32c S.A.S.E. Mintage is 250. The date of the Lincoln cent is 1996-D and is HS shaped as well. ACE members should order these from Bryan also.

Bryan works at GE Production in Fort Wayne. In closing, it was interesting to talk with Bryan for his enthusiasm and out-going personality is quite evident. Thanks again Bryan for your persistence, motivation and will to succeed in producing your book on Fankhauser which is a great contribution to our hobby.
