## Mavericks

### Mavericks identified

Maverick attribution to date: 365 out of 790 \*Probable-positive proof lacking \*\* Positive Proof provided

**KO-2(15)1** - Elect Kowal Mayor\\kmaywhgl, 1957-D, correction from J. Lawniczak, Jim writes, "I can correct another one of the old Mavericks. KO-15, from issue 1 was attributed in issue 2 to Rochester, NY. There is another maverick piece I have seen, a 1951-D, 'Chester Kowal for Comptroller.' Both pieces are from Buffalo. I was led in the right direction on these two by Western NY token and encased dealer Norm Peters who told me they were from Buffalo. A call to the Buffalo and Lake Erie Historical Society confirmed this. The librarian there remembered Chester Kowal as mayor of Buffalo and about the time he died. She quickly found and read to me from his obituary. Kowal died on September 28, 1966 and hsi obituary indicated that he was mayor of Buffalo from 1962-1965. He must have lost his run in this 1957 election."

**RO-1(19)1** - Roosevelt Savings Bank/Gates Ave & Broadway....1920 cent, J. Lawniczak corrected and identified this piece in the last issue(19) to Brooklyn. Jim adds some additional information. He writes, This bank changed its name to Roosevelt Savings Bank from the Eastern District Savings Bank in 1920. This piece lists the start date of the bank in

1896, even though it was chartered in late 1895. By the time the 1945 piece for the Roosevelt Savings Bank came out, the bank records were used to place 1895 as the date of the bank's beginnings. (for more info see mav (666)) Jim stated he gets his information about New York banks off the internet, where there is a posting of all legal dates relating to New York banks : [www.scripophily.com/nybankhist/orye.htm](http://www.scripophily.com/nybankhist/orye.htm)

**GR-1(27)2** - Tomorrow's Banking Today/Grand Prairie/State Bank, 1961-\*Grand Prairie, Texas, Lawniczak, Jim writes, "There is today a Grand Prairie State Bank in Grand Prairie, Texas, which I found in the Yahoo Yellow Pages. I called the bank and found out that this bank was founded in the 1980's and couldn't be the bank in this 1961 encasement. However, I also found out that there was another Grand Prairie State Bank founded in the 1940s, which lasted until the 1980s when it was taken over by Merchantile National Bank. There is an obituary of Raymond Gregory on the Internet, his biography indicated that he worked at the Grand Prairie State Bank from 1946 to 1951. I believe that it is very likely that this was the bank referred to in this encasement." Editor's Note, Gr-1(27)2 was also inadvertently listed under TO-1 (23)1. This has happen on several occasions where the key word is selected differently. Pending on what "jumps out" at the time of the reading. One of the difficulties in cataloging mavericks. This was not caught by the editor until Jim pointed it out.

**BR-1(48)2** - The Brinkerhoff-Faris Trust & Savings Co., ...,Correction from J. Lawniczak, Jim writes, "I did a quick check on the piece by looking at several legal cases that institution was a party to and the attribution actually should be to Clinton. Missouri. There is a 1928 Board of Tax Appeals case which says that Brinkerhoff-Faris Trust & Savings Co. is incorporated under the laws of the State of Miissouri, with principal offices at Clinton. This piece was previously identified as from Clinton, Mississippi."

**AI-1(86)4** - Alliance Zone Cab, PH. 5222 ...,1950-D \*Alliance, Ohio, Lawniczak, Jim writes, "I have this piece in my collection. I also have seen and have a xerox of a 1960-d piece for Zone Yellow Cabs, Taxi, Alliance Ohio, which I have cataloged as OH-ALL-ZO-12. I have cataloged the Alliance Zone Cab as (OH)-ALL-ZO-10, based on the 1960-D piece. I plan on calling the Alliance library shortly to absolutely verify the piece."

**LI-2(97)4** - A. Lincoln Federal /Savings (stamped) 5065, 1972-D, \*Dresher, PA, Lawniczak, Jim writes, "I was able to get a pretty good bead on Maverick 97, the "A. Lincoln Fed. Savings" piece from 1972. If it had been just "Lincoln Federal Savings, the task would have been hopeless, as that name identifies banks in New Jersey, Illinois, Kentucky, Nebraska, South Carolina and California, and those are only the ones I found in two minutes of looking. There was, however, only one institution called, "Abraham Lincoln Federal Savings Association." This organization



was headquartered in the Philadelphia area from at least 1973 through 1990s, when it went under, put into conservatorship by the RTC. There is a 1991 report still on the internet, which indicates that the headquarters of the bank is at 715 Twining Road in Dresher, Pennsylvania. Dresher is a small community in Montgomery county at Suusquehanna Street and Penna. Turnpike, just north of Philadelphia. This doesn't necessarily show where the bank was in 1972 though. Perhaps some of our Pennsylvania members can nail this down, further."

**RI-1(103)4** - Walter Riehlman/For/Congress...1957-D, \*\*Tully, New York, Lawniczak, Jim writes, "I was able to find more Congressmen mavericks by using the Congressional Biographical Information website. Walter Riehlman is from Tully, New York, a small town on I-81 about 25 miles south of Syracuse. He was a Republican first elected in 1946 and finally defeated in the Johnson landslide of 1964.

**SA-6 (105)4** - Geo. Sarbacher/For Congress/Vote for A/Real Veteran\Have Cents/Vote/Republican/1946 cent, \*\*Philadelphia, Pennsylvania Lawniczak, Jim writes, He only served one term 1947-1949, he was defeated in 1948 and again in 1950.

**ES-1(148)5** - Esskay Quality Meat Products, comment form Al Zaika, Al writes, "My 1960 Thomas Register lists this company in Baltimore, Md. There is no mention of any Portland, Or. location.

**BE-3(225)7** - The Bellevue Savings Bank Co....1909 cent, \*\*Bellevue, Ohio, Lawniczak,

Jim writes, "There was 1 1924 lawsuit involving that Bellevue Ohio Bank. The Bellevue Heritage Museum is located today at 200 East Main Street, in the Bellevue Savings Bank Building. There is an archival collection of photographs cataloged on the internet which shows a picture of the Bellevue Savings Bank at the corner of Main and Sandusky streets in Bellevue Ohio in the 1930s. I found no other reference to any Bellevue Savings Bank on the internet and so believe that it is extremely likely that this piece is from Bellevue, Ohio."

**NA-2(227)7** - "Bank with Security" National Bank/312 North 8th St./ open daily 9 am -5 pm...1929 cent and **SE-3(230)7** - Security National Bank/312 North 8th Street "member FDIC..1936 cent - correction from Jim Lawniczak. "There was a Security National Bank in Huntington New York from 1955, but not in the 20s and 30s. As I mentioned last time, there is no 312 N. 8th Street in Huntington. This may be a tough find, as there are very many Security National Banks in the United States. This one won't be found until it is found at 312 N. 8th Street."

**SE-1(250)8** - Jefferson Bank, member F.D.I.C., 1953-D and **JE-2(368)11** - Keep It Safely/ Jefferson Bank/ Member of F.D.I.C./Franklin at Jefferson..1950-D - \*Philadelphia, PA, Lawniczak. Jim writes, "There is a Franklin and Jefferson intersection in Philadelphia, and today there are 19 Jefferson Banks within 9 miles of that intersection. This is not absolute verification, but a possibility. Someone needs to

check a Philadelphia directory for 1950 and see if the Jefferson Bank was at Franklin and Jefferson then. I can't do that by calling the Philadelphia library; they require requests in writing."

**MA-7(337)10** - Manchester Federal Savings and Loan Ass'n 1987-1956, 1956-d,

\*\*Manchester, NH, Lawniczak, Jim writes, "There are 7 legal cases involving the Manchester Fed. S & L Assn., from 1940 to 1963, all in New Hampshire."

**UN-4(455)12** - The Union Bank of Mena/ New Building/ Jan., 1971...1970-D cent, \*\*Mena, Arkansas, Lawniczak. Jim writes, "There are three legal cases involving this bank from 1978 to 1992, all in Arkansas. The bank is still in operation today with four branches in Mena.

**DO-5(482)13** - Doubleday Book Shops. Al Zaika's reply to questions at some of his former attributions, this piece being one. Al writes on May 9, 2000, "The 1960 Thomas Register listing is; Doubleday & Co. Publishers 501 Franklin Ave., Garden City, Long Island, N.Y. (factory at N.Y., N.Y.) In addition, Long Island City is not part of New York City)

**SI-5(542)14** - You Will Be Lucky/If You Help Keep Ed Sittler/In Congress...1952-D \*\*Uniontown, PA, Nolan and Lawniczak, Vic writes, I submitted this encased and since found out that Sittler lived in Uniontown, PA." Jim writes, "Edward Sittler (1952-D) lost the election that this piece was made for. He also only served one term, from 1951-53. He was from Uniontown, Pennsylvania, south and a bit east of Pittsburgh, near the West Virginia border."

**A&P-1(650)17** - A & P, Come See You'll Save At A & P, 1958-d, Al Zaika writes his reason for the Montvale, NJ attribution. Al writes, "I attributed this to Montvale, NJ since that is the location of their national headquarters. In the case of chain store and large industry mavericks, I try to attribute them to the location of their main office or plant."

**Ea-2(666)17** - Eastern District Savings Bank, 1896-1907, 1906 cent, \*\*Brooklyn, New York, Lawniczak. Jim writes, "the piece is very interesting, The Eastern District Savings Bank was founded on Nov. 11, 1895. The bank changed its name in 1920 to the Roosevelt Savings Bank. My guess is that this piece lists the start date of the bank in 1896 because the bank probably did not open for business until 1896, even though chartered at the end of November in 1895. By the time the 1945 encased came out with Roosevelt Savings Bank the 1895 date was used for the bank's beginnings."

**HO-9(703)18** - Hotpoint Lucky Penny. 1951-D cent. Al Zaika's comment on his attribution of this piece. "The 1960 Thomas Register lists this as, Hotpoint Division of General Electric, 5600 W. Taylor St., Chicago, Ill. The only listing for Louisville, KY is The Major Appliance Division, but I understand that the Hotpoint Div. was moved to Louisville some years later. However, since the cent in this encasement is 1951, the Chicago location should prevail."

**JU-4(708)18** - Julius/Where friends of Music Meet/Victory etc., 1945 cent - \*York, PA,

Crow. Harry writes, "I have one in my collection and was told it is from York. I have no city directory to verify but this may be a lead."

**KE-7(712)18** - J. Frank Kelly/ Lumber + Millwork/Protect Your Investment/Always Buy The "Kelly Kind" 2121 Georgia Ave., NW North- 1341, 1949, \*\*Washington D.C., Crow. Harry writes, "listed in the 1941 City Dir. Under Building Materials & Supplies."

**LI-17(728)18** - Lincoln for Congress, 1965 cent \*MD, Crow. Harry writes, "Several years at an auction near Rockville, MD these were sold, 100 per ziplock bag & there were 13 bags. I did not stay long enough to see who bought them. Did this guy run for congress from MD? I am trying to verify. Anyways a common piece."

**MI-14(744)18**, Mickey's Grill, 1 mile north Loomis on Hwy 40, comment from Jim Lawniczak. Jim writes, "I spent some time trying to identify that piece to Ohio as U.S. Hwy 40 is about 2 miles north of a very small town named Loomis Ohio. However, I was unable to locate a Mickey's Grill and have put the piece in my unidentified file, maybe to try again later. I see that it is in the California catalog and is noted as absolutely attributed to Loomis California. I would be happy to take it out of my unidentified pile, but I don't see how the Mickey's Grill fits Loomis, California, as I cannot see any Highway 40 near that town (it's just a bit NE of Sacramento). If you know what the proof positive is on this piece please let me know. I have emailed Duane,"

**PA-8(759)19** - Parkyakarkus Lucky Penny, 1938, no specific city but two leads, Al Zaika writes, "He was a famous radio comedian from the 1930's and 40's. Terry Stahurski writes, As I recall reading, Parkyakarkus (a pseudonym) was a famous radio personality in the 1930s. In fact, I believe he was a noted coin collector and that Bowers and Merena sold his collection, sometime in the 1980s. Perhaps some of our members can recall hearing this radio show and add more insight on this maverick."

**PE-9(762)19** - Senator "Al" Pechan, Ass't Majority Leader, 1968-D, \*\*Western PA, Aqua. Dr. Herman M. sent a copy of a page from a PA. manual with the stats on Albert R. Pechan, majority whip, 41st district, born and resides in Ford City, PA. Elected to Senate in 1948, 52, 56, 60, 64 and 66.

**PE-10(763)19** - A.D. Pelunis/DeSoto, Plymouth, \*Cleveland or a suburb, Stahurski, Terry writes, Mr. Pelunis (Abraham D.) is listed in the 1964 Cleveland East Suburban Directory as president of A.D. Pelunis Motors Co., with his residence in Shaker Heights (an eastern suburb of Cleveland). I don't recall the exact location of his dealership but know that it was in Cleveland or in one of the suburbs.

**PE-11(764)19** - I'm Penny/The Plaza Bank Puppy/ I'm Penny/The Plaza Bank Puppy, 1979-D, hs, ham \*Chicago, Ill, Lawniczak. Jim writes, "I don't have proof positive on the Plaza Bank but my piece came attached to the collar of a stuffed puppy by a key chain that goes through the encased. The person who sold

me the puppy with the encased said that he knew it was from a Chicago Bank, who gave it out as a promotion. I am hoping that your attributors with the bank books can attribute the Plaza Bank from the late 70s, early 80s to Chicago and verify this interesting piece."

**PO-3(767)19** - Pomeroy's World's Fair of Gifts, Lucky Token/Save This Token/It May Be Worth Many Dollars to You At Pomeroy's, 1937, Rd, Al, 35m, \*\*Reading, PA, Zaika. Al writes, "A dept. store from Reading, reference, Ed Dence Charge Coins." Jim Lawniczak comments, "I believe that the Pomeroy's piece is a Pennsylvania piece, here is what I know about it. There is a 1929 encased for "Pomeroy's of Reading, Pa, 53rd anniversary. Steve Alpert attributed this piece in one of his mail sale catalogs to Harrisburg, Pa, based on a charge card token for Pomeroy's Inc. It may be that Pomeroy's was a chain (like A & P). I will be interested in hearing what others say. In addition, does anyone have information linking this piece to the 1939-40 first NY World's Fair? The date and words on the piece suggest a possible connection."

**RI-8(772)19** - Richmond Hill Savings Bank, 1921-25-46\\ Victory....., 1945, rd \*\*Queens, NY, Lawniczak and Zaika, Jim writes, This piece is from Richmond Hill, NY, in NYC, a neighborhood of Queens. The Savings Bank of Richmond Hill was chartered by the state of New York in 1920. It changed its name to Richmond Hill Savings Bank in 1935 and has since been acquired and merged

three times, once each in the 70s, 80s and 90s, until today it is part of the North Fork Bank system, which has numerous branches in Queens and on Long Island. I believe the one year discrepancy between the chartering of the bank probably did not open for business in the year that it was actually chartered. This encased has already been cataloged in my NY catalog as (NY)-(QUE)-RI-20. Many of the bank mavericks are from NYC and metro area. I guess they believed no city was necessary." Al writes, Queens N.Y., ref., Polks Bank Directory"

**RO-14(776)19** - Rosecroft, Raceway, 1978, hs, al, \*\*Port Washington, Maryland, Aqua, Crow, Zaika, Herman A. writes, "See copy of a Race book page, section-Half-Mile Tracks, one of which is Rosecroft Raceway, Port Washington, Maryland." Harry Crow writes, "This racetrack is located in Prince Georges County, MD just east of Oxon Hill, MD, verified by personal knowledge and a map of MD. Al writes, "Fort Washington, Md, Racetrack Guide.

**RO-15(777)19** - Mirror with encased 1935 cent, Rose(cursive) Dress Shops/14495/This mirror Good For 50 cents/On Any Purchase of \$6.99 or more/ At 6402 So. Halsted St.\\ mirror, \*\*Chicago, Il, Aqua, Lawniczak, Zaika, Herman A.-"only Chicago has this address, from Streets in Postal Directory of the U.S.", Jim L., "has to be Chicago. 6402 Halsted is on the south side, just north of 64th St." Al Zaika-since Chicago is the only city with such a high So. Halsted St. address. One for Joel R. to check out."

**SA-13(781)19** - John P. Saylor, Your Congressman\\ U.S.

House of Representatives, 1963-d, \*\*PA, Crow and Lawniczak, Harry C. - "John Phillips Saylor, Republican Representative from PA elected in 1949. From: Biographical Directory of The American Congress 1774-1961." Jim L. - PA, source the Internet.

**SA-16(784)19** - Sammy's - Sales - Service/Used Cars, Sch. Haven 295, 1952-D, rd, al, 35mm, \*\*Schuylkill Haven, PA, Aqua and Crow, Herman A.-see copy of telephone Directory page. Harry C. writes, "Sch. Haven is the abbreviation for Schuylkill Haven, PA which is located in Schuylkill County, PA just south of Pottsville, PA. From: PA map

**SA-17(785)19** - Saratoga Harness Racing Inc. The Track, 1978-D, hs, al, \*\*Saratoga Springs, NY, Aqua and Zaika, Herman M. - see copy of Track book page, Half-Mile Tracks, listed is Saratoga Harness, Saratoga Springs, NY. Al Z.- concurs, " from a personal visit to the track."

**SE-9(790)19** - Compliments of Francis F. Seidel, Inc., Funeral Home, 1946, \*\*Reading, PA, Crow. Harry writes, This is from Reading, PA established 1888 at 117 North Fifth St., from: The National Directory of Morticians, 1960 edition

## New Maverick Listing

Send your mavericks to the editor. Members quite often inquire about purchasing listed mavericks. This is only possible if the owner submits the piece(s) to the club auction. Members can put minimum bids.

Mavericks are numbered and grouped with the first two letters of the surname or major topic.

Each letter group will have its own set of numbers and each piece will also be numbered according to the order listed. The issue number will follow the order number.

## Vulcanite from Dr. Herman Aqua

The Hotel Vending encased dated 1901 from Philadelphia (Issue 19, page 31) is not plastic, but is a compound of vulcanite or hard rubber. Plastic was not discovered as of that era. The material (vulcanite) was used to make dentures (false teeth) and was utilized until the late 30's and into the 40's. That's about the time plastic was discovered.

I have a few sets of vulcanite dentures-they are basically brown and light tan but vulcanite can be black, blue, etc.

Since we are sticklers for detail when we list items, one of the important details (composition of material) should be as accurate as possible, too.

Horseshoe shaped encased.

**Fremont Hotel & Casino-**  
Two varieties of the wording on the reverse: I/BG/L & IB/GL. Both are horseshoe shaped encased.

**Eldorado Club-**  
Two varieties of the design on the obverse: "dots" around the cent & plain. Both are horseshoe shaped encased.

**The Castaways Hotel & Casino -** This encased is struck with the familiar logos of this casino: an island with a man, woman, and palm tree, and "The Castaways" is in a canoe. Horseshoe shaped encased.

**Las Vegas Nevada-**  
Horseshoe shaped encased. This is a "souvenir" piece.

**Reno, Nevada**

**Frontier Club-**  
Horseshoe shaped encased.

**Bright Spot Reno-**  
Horseshoe shaped encased.

**Reno's Bright Spot-**  
Horseshoe shaped encased.

**Harold's Club-**

Do you like your Casino Encased well done, medium, or RARE? "This Get Acquainted Token Entitles The Bearer To Complimentary Drink". Horseshoe shaped, "good for" encased.

**Souvenir Reno-**  
Round 32mm shaped encased.

**Elko, Nevada:**

**Club Elko-**  
Horseshoe shaped encased.

**Stockman's Hotel Casino-**  
This is another rare Casino Encased. It is the only example I have seen. Horseshoe shaped encased.

**Sparks, Nevada:**

**Gold Club-**  
Anodized gold color encasement. Horseshoe shaped encased. A common piece.

**Gold Club-**  
Anodized gold color encasement but very light, almost silver color. I am classifying this as an "error" piece. Rare. Horseshoe shaped encased.

**Reprint from a 1/97 Insert by Bryan Ryker**

I believe one of the most important functions of an Association is to establish conventions to be used for such things as catalog numbers, documenting inscriptions, shapes, reverse slogans, reverse die numbers... You see this with other associations, like for Civil War tokens and transportation tokens. With so little published on encased coins to date, the members of ACE have the unique opportunity to establish those standards going forward. By establishing standard conventions, our hobby will become more organized and unified.

There are many issues that should be discussed, many with no "best" answer. But whatever we decide as a club will become the standard. Who else is there to do this?

I did not get any response on my question to the membership back in August. I thought I would ask again, and maybe the response might be better this time, particularly if others believe in the importance of establishing conventions for our hobby as I do. Also to clarify, there was a typo in how my question appeared in the August issue. The double BACKslash(\\) looked the same as the double slash (/). That may have confused some. Here is my proposal again:

I would like to see a standard convention for documenting the inscriptions on encased coins. What I finally came up with for my catalog involved using a single slash (/) to divide lines of type on the same side of the coin and a double slash (//) to divide lines appearing on opposite sides of the coin. This allows the reader to visualize what the piece looks like. A double backslash (\\) could be used to indicate the start of the writing on the reverse. What other ideas do people have?

Today ACE is using the only double slash (//) to separate the front from the reverse. Today you cannot tell where the break in the inscription is above and below the coin. Many times similar pieces are worded the same, and it helps to know the layout of the wording on the piece.

A second fundamental question is how to formulate catalog numbers. I did a survey before the convention. I very much appreciated seeing Jim Lawniczak carry on the convention in the work he did (which was excellent) on the encased coins of the 1901 Pan-American Exposition. The 20 or so collectors and dealers I surveyed selected as best the following convention (wording taken from my book):

**IN-WOL-BO-10**

**ROBERT BOLLINGER / YOUR POPCORN MAN // WOLCOTTVILLE / INDIANA**

The first two digits (IN) represent the state. The current postal abbreviations are used. "ON" is used for Ontario, and "QU" for Quebec.

The next three digits (**WOL**) abbreviate the town. Unlike other cataloging systems that assign a three-digit number to each town, three significant alpha characters are used. The alpha characters take up the same amount of space and are easier to translate and memorize. Here "WOL" abbreviates Wolcottville. In the event a piece gives two towns in its inscription, the first town is used (for example see IN-FWA-RE-20).

The next two digits (**BO**) are the first two letters of the subject of the piece, as it would appear listed in the phone book. In the above example the letters "BO" are used, since you would look up Robert Bollinger by his last name.]

Judgement may be required when determining the subject of a piece. Some pieces have two or more possible subjects, such as a person's name and the name of a business. In these cases the name of the larger institution is used. For example, the catalog number for : ED CHAMBERS // YOUR FORD MAN / ALLEN COUNTY MOTORS is IN-FWA-AL-24, keying off of Allen County Motors, not Ed Chambers.

The last two-digits (**10**) are numbers used to distinguish between pieces. The numbers were assigned beginning with 10, and increment by 10 to allow for future insertions. However, when the same subject had several different pieces made, the numbers increment by just two in order to conserve numbers.

Whenever a piece was made using several different coins during the same production run, an additional alpha digit (**-A**) is added to the end of the catalog number for each coin used. For example, the two Gold Leaf Tobacco pieces ON-PRI-FO-10-A and -B are identical, except the -A piece has 1963D U.S. cent inside, and the -B piece has a 1959 Canadian cent. Pieces containing coins from different countries are sequenced starting with the U.S. coins first, and then alphabetically by country (see the CA-LME-RO-10-A through -H series). The extra alpha character is a clear and simple indicator of whether similar pieces were made during the same production run.

Whenever the city or state is not stated on the piece (a "maverick") but has been determined by research, it appears in parenthesis.

This convention, using letters instead of numbers, allows an enormous amount of room for insertions. The catalog numbers are very "readable". It was my hope that one day this system would be used to catalog all encased coins.

#### **Editor's Note:**

Bryan's numbering system was adopted at an ACE Central States Show Meeting a few years back. When the ACE books are compiled the above numbering system will be used. As for the standard convention for documenting the inscription this too was adopted. However, at this point individual catalogers are using what works best for them.

## A Few Thoughts from Jim Lawniczak

I'll reply to Al Weinberg's comments on replaced and bent encasements in a few paragraphs but I first wanted to air out some thoughts from a letter I received.

The comment I received was that Al Weinberg's disagreement with my ideas on bent encasements should not have been aired publically. It was suggested instead that he should have kept his criticism private. I would agree with the writer had Al's grievances been personal or if he had gotten personal in them. But they weren't, and he didn't. He spoke only to the ideas that I had thrown out and his disagreement with those ideas and not with me. I think that was wholly appropriate. In fact, as I understand it, that's the idea of the scientific method.

I have a pretty thick skin, when it comes to ideas at least. You may all have noticed that I come up with a lot of ideas and am not shy about sharing them. I sound at most times like I am convinced that all my ideas are always right. That's because I wouldn't mention an idea if I didn't, at the time, think it was right. Experience has shown me over many years, however, that some of my ideas turn out to be wrong. I like to think not too many, but some. This is something we all have in common, it is part of being human. Thus, of all the many things I have said in the Casement so far, I am certain some of them are wrong. So, I welcome other ideas and challenges to my ideas, when those challenges are presented fairly and without personal attack, as Al Weinberg's comments were.

Anyway, let me respond to the substance of the issue of bent encasements. This time, I stand on my ideas. An encasement can be bent so that light shows through and I have done it and so can anyone. I took a 1974D horseshoe encasement, with the cent firmly in the encasement as all 1974 encasements are (there is a heavy black stain over 2/3 of the cent reverse, which is why I sacrificed this encased). The only thing I did to the encasement was made a few bends and light shows through. If I bend it back, voila, no light. If I kept working at it, I'm sure that the cent could be popped out.



I am not as certain that you can "fix" a replaced encasement so that no light shows through, but I think you can. I took a Pan Am clover washer encased and put a 1943 cent in it. Light showed through all around. By trial and error bending, I was able to get the piece to a point where only 3 minute dots of light showed through. Unfortunately, my next bend was the wrong way and I popped the cent out. I took another inexpensive encasement that I received that had very small light showing through and by very slight bending and moving the cent in the encasement was able to get no light whatsoever to show through. There, though, I am not absolutely certain whether the bending or moving the cent caused the lack of space. But there is no question that bending the encasement changes where the light shows through. This is another experiment that others can replicate.

In any event, the main point of my idea on bending was that any bent encasement was a signal to be very cautious about the originality of the piece. And that is sound advice. Bending is one way to remove a cent from an encasement in order to spend it.

I recently received a couple other interesting pieces that added to my knowledge of the replaced cent issue. The first was a bell Souvenir of Niagra Falls in a style that I hadn't seen before (the piece will be (NY)-NIA-SV-32 in my NY catalog). No light shown through but there was a part of the cent rim that was sticking above the encasement. I don't see how a cent can be struck into an encasement and still protrude out over the encasement. The cent was not in loosely, but I was able to punch it out with substantial pressure. On any other piece when I have ever punched out a cent, I have never been able to get it back in with no light showing. But this time I was able to do put this cent back in, make it flush with the encasement and voila, no light shown through. The cent can probably be pushed out again with substantial pressure, but not with moderate pressure. My guess is that this is an original cent that was probably punched out at some point (maybe just by some kid who wanted to see if it could be done) and then put back in but not all the way. There are several marks on the rim of this cent that are consistent with an encased struck coin.

The next piece was even more interesting. It is a Pan American clover piece of a variety that I did not have -- a PX-16B5 in my new numbering system. I noticed that there was no light showing and that the obverse of the cent had the usual marks that all clover encased have. But the obverse marks were not aligned with the corresponding positions on the encasement! The rotation was about 20 degrees. I was able to punch this cent out too with substantial pressure. I then realigned the marks to match the encasement and put the cent back in. It popped in perfectly with no light showing and is in firmly (though I'm sure that a good push will get it back out). My speculation on this piece is the same as

on the previous piece -- the cent was original and was pushed out at some point and put back in, 20 degrees off.

On to more disagreements. I received a nice letter from Dr. Herman Aqua taking me to task for calling the Hotel Vendig 1901 encased made out of plastic. I have the same thoughts on this that I had on Al Weinberg's comments -- the challenge was to my ideas and not to me personally, and was written in a friendly and helpful tone. So, as with Alan's comments, I welcome and appreciate these comments.

On this one, Dr. Aqua is right. I had used the word "plastic" as from a dictionary definition: "capable of being moulded, pliable, a group of synthetic products derived from casein, cellulose, etc. which can be readily molded." That's one of the problems of being a cataloger -- you have to say something about the piece. I thought that "plastic," as defined above and using the etc. liberally, described this substance, and in any event, it was the only description I knew of that came close.

I did have an impression at the time that plastics, as we know them, were invented around the time of WWII, and I think that's what Dr. Aqua was referring to in his comment to me. But here, I'm not so sure he's right. I just received (from you Jerry of all people) Professor Roger Fischer's book on political material, "Tippecanoe and Trinkets Too." In it, he refers (on page 144) to the "first commercially successful plastic, celluloid," developed in 1868.


In any event, I looked up "Vulcanite" in the dictionary and it is a rubber product, hardened by sulfur and heat. My calling the piece "plastic" was further hammered by the dictionary comment on the word "vulcanization," which was described as "the process of treating crude rubber with sulfur or its compounds and subjection it to heat in order to make it nonplastic." The dictionary must have been using "plastic" there in its meaning of pliable.

Thanks to Dr. Aqua for that correction and I will make the correction for the NY catalog. I believe that the PX-80 pieces and the Niagara Falls encased in the "hard plastic" are both of vulcanite too.


## Coin Magazine Encased from M. Allen

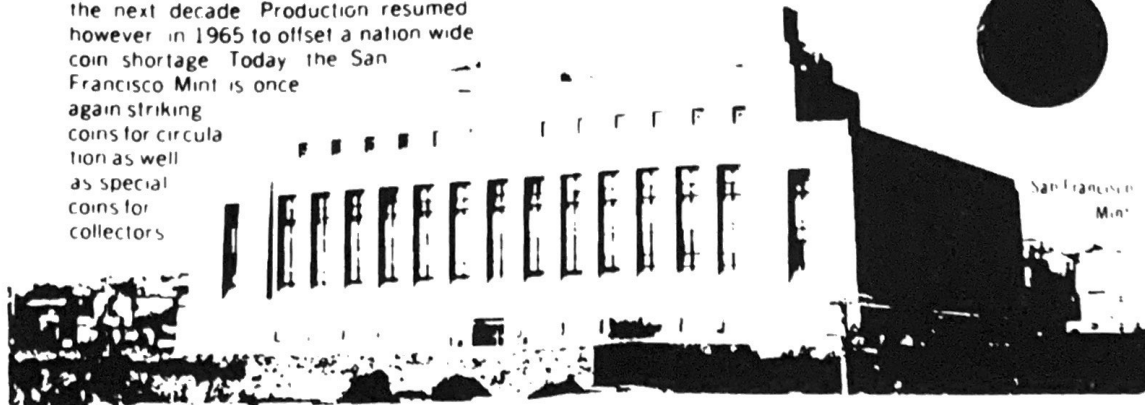
